### A member's story,

As a little girl growing up, I used to lay awake at night, terrified of being sucked up by the black hole. I would make sure my bedspread was folded a certain way, so that nothing bad would happen to me and I could get what I want. I'd pray every night for Jesus to come into my heart, just in case he left during the day. That way "if I died before I wake" I'd be ok. In these ways I experienced fear and powerlessness at a young age, and found sufficient ways to manage those experiences.

I grew up in a big beautiful family, on a farm, where I was in charge of collecting the eggs, among other chores. But I preferred playing alone with my dolls and day-dreaming on my bike. When I did play with my siblings, I naturally attempted to be in charge. I was notorious for tattle tailing on my older siblings and crying inconsolably when I didn't get my way. I was one of six children, but felt as if I was the most special and the most sensitive. When I would babysit my younger siblings, I'd tell them that I was on an errand from God and they'd get points in Heaven if they did what I said. I was a natural manipulator and I learned that lying made situations that much easier, stories that much more colorful.

I was painfully self-conscious and I felt ugly and unwanted most of the time. If I wasn't invisible, people were whispering about me. So, I watched people to see how I should act so that they would like me. I made pacts with myself to hide anything and everything that wasn't attractive. I worked at being the best in all situations and avoided looking bad at all costs. I thought I knew who I was. I thought I knew what I wanted. And I thought I knew where I was headed. I knew that one day I'd either save the world, or be so memorable that even God would buy a ticket to my show.

In high school, I met alcohol and it had me at Hello! Drinking rearranged my world and made me feel connected to everything I'd felt apart from. I was thrilled whenever I got to have it. It took care of me, protected me, and it gave me meaning and peace to every situation. It brought the world to its knees and lifted me up into the heavens. So, I began to drink every chance I got and the blackouts started.

In college, I'd frequently wake up in a pool of alcohol sweat surrounded by empty cheese packages, trying to recall the shenanigans from the night before. Once I woke up in a hamper in a closet in a house full of men I'd never met. One time I came to on a small raft floating in the middle of a pool. Another time I woke up under the sink in the women's bathroom at a Grateful Dead concert and was rushed to the hospital on the premise of having a heart attack.

None of those experiences scared me. In fact, I felt they were points of pride and stories that made me interesting and deep. The crazier, the better. To me drinking meant I was free and living my best life. I didn't even think about my relationship with alcohol until I met Joey. Joey would be my Eskimo into AA and the father of my daughter. He was sober and knowing him slapped me awake to my own drinking.

For some reason I showed up that night at the restaurant where I worked. I'd wanted to call in sick and go out drinking, but I couldn't get anyone to cover my shift. Joey came into the restaurant that night and set his sights on me. He told the friend he was with, "I found the woman I'm going to marry". From that moment on, I couldn't get rid of him. He was sober and he pursued me. So, I married him. I was still drinking and he would say to me, "Run, baby, run", which I did not understand at the time. But eventually he relapsed and I was suddenly thrust into his Dr. Jeckel & Mr. Hyde life.

It was then, through many episodes of pain, and mistaking "him" as my problem, that I began to see alcohol as my problem. I eventually wandered into Alcoholics Anonymous.

I tried to quit drinking a few times, not realizing I might not be able to stop. I eventually got

some time, then drank again by way of a "harmless" joint at a Tom Petty concert. It wasn't until then that I realized I really was drinking again, and maybe I was just like those other AAers. I could stop drinking, but I could NOT STAY stopped. So, I came back to AA with both feet this time.

My best friend in AA shot herself on the day I got sober and I attended her funeral sober, committed to living a life bigger than myself. That's when I met my new sponsor. I felt so deflated and unworthy that I was afraid she wouldn't want to sponsor me. But she gave me a big hug and told me she'd be honored. She told me her job was to take me through those steps, and to keep me busy until my higher power takes over. She told me she believed in me and that I was capable of this way of life. And I found that I relied on that belief when I didn't believe in myself. She shared with me about God and the spiritual aspect of the program. I knew that's what I was missing.

She told me that in AA it might feel like I'm jumping back and forth between two chairs. One chair up against the back wall of the meeting, feeling like an outsider. Not knowing if I fit in AA. The other chair right in the middle of the group, surrounded by sobriety and knowing I'm in the right place. At first, I'd be more comfortable in the chair on the outside, and I might feel awkward, uncomfortable, and scared in the middle. But gradually that would completely change and I'd feel uncomfortable sitting at edges of recovery, and at home and at peace in AA and in sobriety.

She drilled in me that before I was allowed to call her with an issue, I had to pray and write about it first. It took me a while to actually do that, but when I finally did, the only reason I was calling her was to share the solution that had been revealed to me. She said that's what it looks like to experience the hand of God and your higher power. She took me through the steps in every area of my life, and taught me that serenity is an inside job, and it's never them. She taught me the difference between power and human power, and that no human power could solve my problem. But God who has all power could and would if he were sought.

I had to leave my marriage to raise my baby daughter on my own. But I was never on my own. AA was always there and has helped us grow up up together. All along, the people in AA showed me the way. Ralphie taught me that in a relationship you accept who they are and who they are not, and not hold against them who they are not. Jimmy taught me what the spiritual malady we suffer from looks like and feels like. He also taught me that the truth doesn't require my belief to operate, but my belief is what I experience, regardless, if it's true or not. Molly showed me how I was still blocked after years of sobriety. I was able to see how alcohol is but a symptom, and that SELF manifested in various ways was my problem. I looked up words in the 1936 dictionary and I was able to see things in the Big Book I've never seen before. I learned the nature of my insanity and became aware of the alcoholic mind that drives me. I experienced how my old ideas are like pieces of fruit: if there's a rotten one, it can infect the whole bowl. I came to see my mind is the seat of my soul, and in order to live in the world of the spirit, I had to be driven by my soul. I have been blind and as a result of AA I have been gifted access to Power through the tools and actions of the program. And it's the obedience to those actions that initiates that sight, and wakes me up to a vital spiritual experience. The Great Reality, that I have chased my whole life, first through alcohol, then victory over alcohol, and now the opportunity to experience God through work and helping others.

It's not my life, it's not my money, it's not my time. It's God's and I get to ride along in awe and be grateful. It continues to be the most beautiful surprise to live in this world, but not of it. Great Reality within or bust!



### **Helpline Help Needed!**

More people are needed for "The Helpline".
